invaluable in understanding the standard of living of income carners gut their families. Such studies involve field investigations in the course of which data on household structure, income and expenditure are collected from manhers of the households.

Similarly, this study which was based on a field survey carried out by the writer among the fishermen in Beserah, Pahang, will, it is hoped, throw some light on the standard of living of the fishermen in Malaya, particularly in the east coast. However, this is not a separate survey by itself but an integral part of the economic survey of Beserah by Unghu Abdul Axis of the Department of Economics, University of Malaya.

I am grateful to Ungku Axis not only for the supervision he gave during the survey but also for his guidance during the time of writing. I am also grateful to Mr. Lim Chong Tah of the Ministry of Commerce and Industry, Singapore, for his constructive criticism and valuable suggestions.
